Meeting records Transcript

Summary

Harley Thomas, the only attendee, conducted the working group meeting and recorded minutes for the AATP website, reviewing the agenda that emphasized participation from the Australian agricultural community and collaboration while not incorporating specific proprietary software into process deliverables. Thomas reviewed AATP website updates, including a new animated landing page and true examples of digital livestock and product passports showing transparency graphs with clickable nodes, with plans to extend these updates to the grains and horticulture pages. Finally, Thomas discussed the need to flesh out digital traceability events using the Deacon a gift guidelines as inspiration and noted the significance of Australian agriculture industries like seafood, which is not yet represented on the AATP site.

Details

Working Group Context and Agenda Review Harley Thomas confirmed the
meeting proceeded despite no attendees, to record meeting minutes for the
AATP website. The proposed agenda included welcoming potential new
members, reviewing housekeeping, and working group principles emphasizing
participation from the Australian agricultural community, valuing input across
commodities, and encouraging collaboration. A key principle is that the AATP
does not seek to incorporate specific hardware or proprietary software
requirements into process deliverables (00:00:00).

- AATP Website Updates and Digital Passports Harley Thomas reviewed recent changes to the AATP website, including a new animated landing page and updated guidance for the livestock industry. The site now includes new web components that provide true examples of a digital livestock passport and a digital product passport, demonstrating what a transparency graph looks like with clickable nodes that render different credentials. For technical users, a JSON tab shows the underlying code for these credentials, and this update has been applied to the digital livestock passport, deforestation, processed meat, and animal processing event pages, with plans to extend this to the grains and horticulture pages (00:01:14).
- Digital Traceability Events and Future Scope Harley Thomas discussed the need to further flesh out digital traceability events, which are a core part of the UNP, capturing the "who, what, where, when, and why" of movement in the supply chain. The AATP site has been updated to propose using the Deacon a gift guidelines (the Australian guide to implementing food traceability) as inspiration, noting its similarity to the GS1 EPCIS event models the UNP is based on. Discussion was also planned to explore other Australian agriculture industries not yet covered, such as seafood, which lacks representation on the AATP despite its significance. Thomas concluded by stating follow-up actions include recruiting more working group participants and starting work on guidance for additional sectors and industries (00:02:24).
